BEVA SURVEYS - RETENTION

- More going self-employed (Covid, corporatisation?)
- > Over 80% vets and nurses work 'full-time'
- Working 30-55hr weeks (max 100)
- Over 34% vets and 54% nurses likely to change jobs in the next 2yrs
- Reasons for leaving: WLB, family & salary (reverse order for nurses)
- > 15% / 10% would not choose career again









BEVA SURVEYS - RECRUITMENT

- > Over 50% struggling to recruit new grad vets
- > 77% for experience vets
- **15% trainee nurses**
- **45% experienced nurses**










BEVA STRATEGY

- Supporting members
- **Affiliate organisation members**

- **Client education**
- Make the work fit the workforce, not the workforce fit the work!







FVE SURVEY 2023


- **Estimated 6.99 million horses in Europe**
- > 328,494 vets in Europe (all species/disciplines)
 - **21% were working in equine**
 - > % of vets working in equine by country varied from 8% (LT) to 47% (RO)
 - > 7% of all cases treated were equine
- > 12,397 respondents across 37 countries in Europe





FVE SURVEY 2023

- > Median age 44
- > 65% female
- > 66% work full time
- **49% have 15+ yrs experience**
- > 67% work in private sector
- > 44% UK vets employed (corporatisation) Vs only 6 EU countries >20% (SE, NO)







EARNINGS

- **▶** €48,000 vet average year earning
 - highest CH & IE
 - **Lowest RS & RO**
- Highest paid vets work in education & research
- **38% of vets aged >40yrs earn €70,000+ (median €60,000)**
 - **13% of <40yrs earn €70,000+ (median €38,400)**
 - > Slow to rise? Mortgage/house, family/kids...
- Female median €46,400 Vs Male median €55,360

education and research is the highest paid work




the full time equivalent median salary of female and male veterinarians





HOURS

- > Average 36.9 hrs/week
- > 1/3 do not work 'out of hours'
- Lack of skills at graduation?
 - Takes 2yrs to achieve economic independence following graduation







SATISFACTION & WELLBEING

- > Average score 7/10 for choice of profession
 - > CH, DK & FI most satisfied
- > 5/10 for work-life balance
- **5.5/10 for income**
- > 90% are stressed
- 23% have taken >2 weeks off work due to...
 - > depression, burn-out, exhaustion or compassion fatigue
- **25% likely to leave profession + further 18% 'somewhat likely'**



EXPECTATIONS FOR THE FUTURE

- Increased demand for SA/CA & exotics
- Decreased demand for equine, goat & sheep
- > Growth of specialism & telemedicine
- Increase in costs (products, medicines, administration)
- Increase in clients unable to pay their bills
- > Increase in corporatisation
- > 8/10 in favour of One Health agenda
 - > 'As a profession we need to stand out globally and demonstrate our One Health commitment'.








THE CHALLENGES FOR EQUINE

- > Future demand?
- > Graduates choosing small animal over equine
- **Loss of experienced vets**
 - > Inflexible working
 - **Feminisation**
 - Corporatisation
- > Social license of equestrian sports?
